It's Your "Turn" - and You Won't Be Gouged!

Making Good Shavings

I would like to jump right into seeing what good wood turning has been accomplished in the past month, provide more time for the demonstrators and for questions and answers. My intention is to have a printed handout for all club announcements, skip some of the hot air and get right into shavings, sawdust and turnings.

We are still looking for a few people to help out with the audiovisual needs during meetings. No one individual should have to be behind the camera at every meeting. Anyone interested in helping in this area please contact Dewayne Hines, VP. If we could get 3 or 4 people to rotate the camera duties it would not be too hard on anyone.

Don't forget the Empty Bowls event.

We seemed to have a good showing of interest into having a Mentor Program. A mentor is someone who enjoys providing training, encouragement, advice, help in building jigs, and other woodturning related help for the rest of our club members. A mentor seems to be a good person to have around. Initial plans are for mentors to conduct an event that will be specific in nature. Suggested event topics are (but not limited to): Beginning bowl and vessel turning, carving and other advanced techniques, Christmas ornaments, computers, economics of selling items, end grain turning of bowls and vessels, enhanced decorations on turned items, hollow form turning and lidded vessels, lidded boxes, pen turning, styles and difficulties, peppermills-spindle boring, proper finishes, segmented turnings, sharpening - technical details, techniques of tool usage, spindle turning, thread cutting, and turning for lefties.

These events probably should consist of a meeting with as few as three and as many as eight participants depending on the subject and interest. The intent is hands-on tutoring rather than demonstration only, which is the reason for the relatively small meetings. Once the mentors are recruited, topics picked and mentors availability is worked out, sign up for these events would be at the club meetings. Or, you can contact the mentors with your questions and they will listen to your requests, decide how they can best help and they will provide you with telephone assistance, invite you to their shop, or come to your shop. This is an offer you need to take advantage of. All you need to do is ask. You can also talk to them at our club meeting.

It is time to start making plans to attend the 15th Annual SouthWest Association of Turners (SWAT) Woodturning Symposium, to be held in Temple Sept. 29 - Oct. 1. The symposium is sponsored by AAW chapters in Texas and Oklahoma.

The SWAT Symposium is a great opportunity to try the symposium experience at a significantly lower cost than the AAW national symposium. The national lead demonstrators for 2006 are Dave Hout (metal spinning and basic bowl turning), Andre Martel (hook tool and hollow forms), Andi Wolfe (pyrography and multi-layer coupling) and David Nittman (Native American basket design). Although they haven't been named yet, there will also be a regional lead demonstrator and a large number of regional demonstrators. As with last year, there will also be a separate demonstration room devoted strictly to pen turners.

The Instant Gallery will give you a chance to show off some of your best work and see what other turners are doing. The vendor's room will give you a chance to get to know the folks that you only normally deal with through catalogues and their web sites.

Another highlight of the annual SWAT Symposium is the Two-for-One Raffle. Your raffle tickets go into a bin to be drawn at the banquet on Saturday night for an excellent piece of woodturning art. Winners' tickets then go back into the bin and are eligible to win tools, wood and other goodies at lunch on Sunday.

Joanie Genender is planning another Ladies Program. These activities, including tours, shopping and a Ladies Gallery, have greatly enhanced the event for the spouses who now have a chance to visit and get to know one another.
