I still consider myself a beginner to intermediate turner and was fortunate to have my first lesson with Alan Lacer this year. I still turn pens from time to time but have moved into boxes as one of my favorite items to turn. If only it was easy to cut end grain! That is my one area I am still trying to improve. I just turned my first goblet so I am now only three years behind Steve Ott. But don't worry, Steve, I don't think I am going to catch you. In the time that I have been with the club, I have seen a subtle shift in what I believe interests many club members. When I first came to the club it was mostly bowls, a lot of natural edge bowls and big bowls (think Jim Tanksley.) That is still the interest of many members but I believe spindle turning is increasingly becoming an area in which many members are interested. Part of the reason for this is, I believe, because of the ready availability of good, well built small lathes that lend themselves to spindle turning. Pen turning is nothing more than spindle turning and the tools for spindle turning are not necessarily the same as with bowl turning. Skews and spindle roughing gouges just do not have a place in most bowl turnings. Techniques and tool control are also different for each.

Pen turning is where I started in woodturning and it will always have a special place in my heart. Hopefully my presentation will kindle an interest in pen turning if you have never turned a pen, and maybe address some issues you are having if you already turn pens. I hope to see you at the October meeting and will try to answer any questions you might have.

... from the Editor

I attended SWAT October 16-18. This was the first time I had been to a woodturning symposium (I enjoyed the sessions I attended and regretted missing some due to conflicts with other sessions.) Since this was my first time, I decided to take Thursday off and follow Dave Marshall and John Horn to Wichita Falls and help with whatever they needed help with.

We went up on Thursday afternoon. John picked up turners from the airport and I helped Dave prepare the demonstration room and audio/visual equipment. We finished for the night around 8:00pm and Dave, John, and I went to find a place to eat. The first place we tried closed at 8:00pm and the second place was closed as well. We then realized Wichita Falls was small enough that a lot of places close fairly early. We decided to try an Italian restaurant and it was still open. We went in and there was only 1 table being used. We ordered and the food came out in a reasonable amount of time. About ten minutes later, Dave jumped up and rushed over to the other occupied table. He had heard a noise and noticed that something was not right. The diner was apparently choking. Dave pulled him out of the booth and started performing the Heimlich maneuver. The restaurant personnel had noticed a "commotion" and, upon realizing what was happening, called 91. John Horn and I were there to help but there was not much we could do. The diner was turning a dark blue color. Dave kept up the Heimlich maneuver and then we heard some evidence that some air was getting into the diner's lungs. His color started to improve a little so Dave held him up to make sure nothing happened to block his airway

again. Fortunately at that time a fireman came in (it was probably only a couple of minutes since 911 was called - there was a fire station right across the street from the restaurant) and took over from Dave. The fireman performed the Heimlich maneuver a few times to finish the job. By my reckoning, and I believe John will back me up on this, Dave saved that guy's life - first by noticing there was a problem and then by performing the Heimlich maneuver on him. We should all be proud of our club's president and his quick action. I had never been around a situation like that before and I am duly impressed with and proud of Dave. So if you plan on choking on food at any time in the future, inviting Dave to eat with you would be a wise move. And when you see Dave, tell him he "done good."
