Long-stemmed Goblets

David Dick, of Austin, will be the featured demonstrator at our March meeting. His topic, "Long-Stemmed Goblets on the Mini-Lathe", will show some easy ways to join parts of the goblet together which will allow a turner of any skill level to achieve a long-stemmed goblet of any length. The hollowing of the goblet will be done with a spindle gouge which is an extremely efficient end grain hollowing tool. He will show an easily made alternative to the skew, and an easy way to produce mortise and tenon joinery on the lathe. Two tools that he loves to use

are the skew and the skew-chi gouge. He will use both of them in the demo. Dick has a tip or two that lets his students start to use a skew easily. Nothing beats practice.

David has been turning for about 17 years. He started by making a lot of pens for sale. As his interest in pens wound down he started turning parts for other people's broken furniture. David is a Past President of the Central Texas Woodturners and a professional contract woodturner. To this day he considers himself more of a spindle turner than a bowl turner.

Below are the scheduled classes.

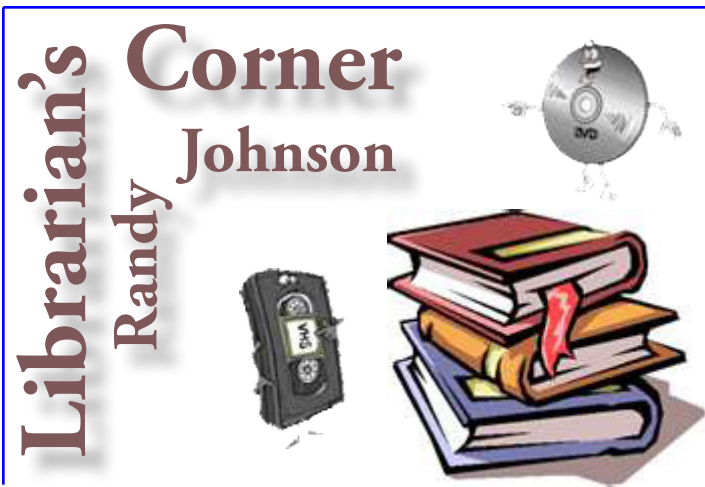

His video "Turning Projects from Scrap" is a classic and one that I would highly recommend to any turner, beginner or advanced. If you are an AAW member, the DVD or VHS tape sells for \$19.00 on the AAW web site at <http://www.woodturner.org>.

Bob primarily turns small to medium sized objects that can be completed in a relatively short period of time. He is recognized as an excellent teacher and demonstrator. His style of demonstrating and teaching is an easy going, relaxed presentation that puts everyone at ease and promotes confidence in the student. Whether a person is an absolute beginner at woodturning or very advanced, having instruction from Bob Rosand will be a very worthwhile experience that you won't forget.





VIDEO REVIEW

subject: TORMEK®:Sharpen Less - Turn More

Last year I received a DVD in Woodturning Design (you really should subscribe to this fine magazine) and although the subject of the DVD was extremely interesting, I put it away and thought no more about it. In one of my few moments of house cleaning I came across the DVD again and even though I do not own a Tormek sharpening system, curiosity made me view it. I am sure many of you do own one. I know for a fact that Bill Boehme is intimately familiar with his (keep the pointy end down next time Bill.) As I was saying, after viewing the DVD it was clear it would make a great addition to the library. So here is my review of the 1 hour and 20 minute Tormek DVD.

The DVD is divided into two sections: a menu on Sharpening and a menu on Turning Tips. Within the sharpening menu there are eight categories of using the Tormek system and attachments:

1. TNT System Fundamentals
2. Bowl Gouges
3. Spindle Gouges
4. Roughing Gouges

5. Skew Chisels
6. Scrapers
7. Parting Tools
8. Specialty Tools

The turning tips section is a great section for beginning turners and covers four areas:

1. Side Grind Bowl Gouges
2. Fingernail Grind Spindle Gouges
3. Skew Chisels
4. Scrapers and Scraping techniques

This video has detailed instructions on using the Tormek sharpening system and the various attachments to need to sharpen turning tools, presented by Jeff Farris. Even though this video only addresses turning tools, the Tormek system is capable of a whole lot more than just sharpening turning tools, items like scissors, knives, axes, and so forth. While the other items are mentioned, Jeff refers to the Tormek manual that comes with each machine on how to sharpen tools other than turning tools. Even in the specialty tool section only the Bedan is shown being sharpened. The detailed instruction booklet is where the viewer is directed for other tools like the spindle master that is shown but not demonstrated in the video.

Special note for the Turning Tips section - If you are not in the market for, or do not own a Tormek sharpening system, the turning tips section alone is well worth the viewing. Within this section are hints on direction of cuts and even the comment that in woodturning there are no absolutes and many times the turner will have to cut in the direction the wood wants to be cut not necessarily the direction it should be cut. Bowl techniques are shown on how to start an interior cut; shear scraping is demonstrated as a technique and not necessarily a technique for just one tool. A goblet is turned and

the skew is shown for certain cuts that no other tool can make. Yes Larry, it can do other things other than open paint cans. Scraping was demonstrated as a technique not just specific to scrapers. Almost any tool can scrape and scraping is presented as more of a finishing technique than bulk wood removal technique. Along with scraping, shear scraping was more than adequately presented.

The TNT Sharpening system uses a wet stone at slow speed to give the turner extremely sharp cutting edges. If you won't believe me then ask Bill Boehme. He can not only tell you but probably show you some evidence of how sharp his tools are. There are two machines available: the T3 and the T7. The chart below chart lists some of the differences.

Neither machine comes with all of the attachments you may need in woodturning but Tormek offers a wood turners kit for only \$289.95. After seeing the video and all the attachments that I may need and paying tax would push the cost to just below \$1000 for a total system for my wood turning needs. Is it worth it? Only you can answer that question. There is no doubt that this is an excellent and very versatile system. If you want a system capable of putting a superior edge on your turning tools give the Tormek due consideration. Just realize it will take you a while to shape a new gouge out of the package into the shape you want because no tool comes out of the package ready to use. This makes the Tormek a very slow tool shaping machine and you

may wish to get the tools into the shape you want on a dry grinder and then do the final shaping on the Tormek to speed up the process. Please check out this video and give a viewing and you will come away impressed with the Tormek system, I know I did. Happy turning.
