President's message

[Editor's note: This article is a reprint from last month's newsletter. Dave has a very full calendar this month.]

Now that we have all settled into the dull routine of summer and have acclimated to those nice, consistent summertime temps, I'm sure that all in our Club are out making mounds of shavings in the shop/garage/driveway/doghouse. Me too! But I must take a few breaks now and then and keep the fluids going non-stop (sometimes I actually drink water)...but it's all in the name of woodturning. We have deadlines coming up that we need to get ready for. SWAT will be here in an instant (raffle projects needed and Instant Gallery pieces needed), Empty Bowls are needed every month, and Beads of Courage boxes and Christmas is right around the corner (turned wood jewelry gifts for the wife and rattles for the babies and ornaments needed for the tree.)

To get started on all these things we need **Inspiration**. And I'm not just talking about the classic rod or whip or deadline to get you going but rather the artistic inspiration that we all

need to turn a piece. Whether it is a bowl or platter, kitchen utensil or piece of art...it all starts with inspiration. What made ya do it? A lot of our inspiration comes from the simple "need" of something... you need a pizza cutter, so you make her one. You need a bread bowl, so you make her one; wooden spoon, you make her one; baseball bat...I wouldn't make her one - they hurt. Need to get out of the doghouse? Make her some turned wooden jewelry. So that was easy. Our "needs" drive our inspiration...if it were only that easy. If you are headed to SWAT next month, you may "need" to turn a piece for the Raffle or Instant Gallery. So, the "need" is there but what are you going to turn? You want it to be special, well executed, and have meaning. So what do **you** do for your inspiration?

There are lots of things that can inspire you. We've seen a couple of large, golf tees brought to our meetings. "Sports" can be an inspiration. Golf tees, artistic, creative baseball bats, golf balls (that's a challenge

to you), pool cues, etc. Books and magazines can be sources of inspiration, but I typically don't go down that route right away. I think there are better sources to get my ideas flowing.

How many of you look to "nature?" Take a walk; look at clouds; envision the bowl in that chunk of wood waiting to escape. Other idea sources can include searches on the internet, but again, I try to avoid that to get truly original and unique inspiration. Religion? Customer needs? Sometimes (especially in these warmer months) I'll head to the museum (they keep them really cool in there) or leaf through "art books" at the cool library. Holidays? We just had July 4th...did any of you turn a patriotic-themed piece? Other art forms and mediums? I like to look at a lot of pottery and ceramics, the old, classic forms, especially Native American, Greek, Italian, and French forms. This month I visited the new glass gallery on Magnolia Street in Fort Worth called SiNaCa. There were a lot of beautiful work and colors. That sort of stuff gets me thinking. Next week, Tanksley and I are headed to Arrowmont. Yeah, I plan to spend a lot of time in the woodturning shop, but I will definitely make time to visit all the other shops and galleries that reside at Arrowmont. That place should be teeming with inspiration!

Last week, to escape the heat of Fort Worth, Tracy and I headed to one of the coolest places around...Austin. Man oh man, talk about a place to get inspiration. All the neat little quirky,

indie shops, museums, hippies, tattoos on hippies, dreadlocks, BBQ...you get the idea. Inspiration can be found almost everywhere, but you got to look for it. Open your eyes but more importantly, open your mind. When "it" hits you, go to the shop and work on it. You may not get the results you want right away, so you keep working on it for a while. Try different methods; experiment (experimentation... another great source for inspiration!); deviate (no James, not deviant).

So, now that I have "inspired" you, you need to come up with some inspiration for our **Empty Bowls project**. Turn a cool bowl and donate it this month. Please help those in need in our community. It takes so little effort on our part to turn a bowl or platter which then brings in premium dollars to the Tarrant Area Food Bank. You wouldn't believe how many people are fed by our bowl donations

Finally, please be inspired to attend SWAT (<http://www.swaturners.org/>). The Instant Gallery and all of the demonstrations are great sources of inspiration. Early SWAT registration is now closed but you can still register and attend. SWAT is August 26 through the 28 in Waco.

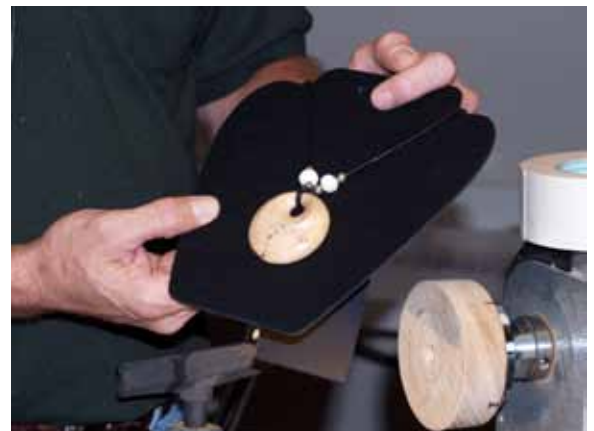
