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My love of woodturning started innocently enough in early June 2009 in Ketchikan, Alaska. I was standing in an art gallery shoulder-to-shoulder with dozens of passengers crowded around a display of native crafts. I had probably seen hand-turned bowls at other times in my life, but there in that gallery, I saw bowls and platters turned from native Alaskan woods and displayed, not as kitchen utensils, but as art. The beautiful lines, rich colors and textures, and exorbitant prices captivated me. And I uttered the words my wife has come to expect in just this sort of situation: "I bet I could make that."



When we returned from that cruise, I wasted no time. I dug an old Shopsmith out of mothballs (it was rusting away in a buddy's barn) and cleaned it up. I had never used it as a lathe

Oh well, it's cheaper and more serene than golfing.... usually.

before, so I had to find all the parts to make it serve that purpose. I recognized that I had no idea what to do. So I looked online for a class and found one scheduled at the Woodcraft store in Addison. It was to be taught by a fellow by the name of John Horn. You might know him.

I took his class and discovered in those few Thursday evenings a new and somewhat addictive art form that suited my particular aptitude for creativity, design, and motor skills. I love turning bowls and vessels and enjoy in particular turning them out of what I call "distressed" wood. Generally speaking, the wood I use is salvaged from dead trees that fell on their own, or trees that were blown down during storms. I never shy away from cracks, spalted wood, wood with rotted areas and bark inclusions. To me, wood with imperfections is the most interesting to turn. Unfortunately, turning distressed wood often produces distressing results. I end up with a lot of cracks in the bowls I rough turn and air dry.

In an effort to save a particularly nice bowl that cracked during the drying process, I developed a technique I call "pre-inlay" using wooden dowels and aluminum or brass

rods. This "pre-inlay" technique has allowed me to save some lovely bowls that would have otherwise been too dangerous to finish turn due to the cracks running through their walls and bottoms.

The technique is simple enough to try and I encourage you to look at bowls that crack during the drying process not as losses, but as opportunities to use this technique. This technique is not limited to repair of cracked bowls, though. You can use this technique to spice up an otherwise boring bowl by adding inlays of contrasting color or soft metal. The steps involved in the "pre-inlay" process are as follows:



1. Use a vise, clamp, or WorkMate to hold the rough-turned bowl securely.
2. Determine where you need to place the dowels or metal rods in order to strengthen the crack. (In the case of decorative application, simply determine where the dowels will produce an aesthetically pleasing addition.)
3. Use a brad-point drill bit to drill (or start) the hole. A standard drill bit will walk when trying to drill at an oblique angle.
4. If the finished hole requires a longer bit, you can change to a standard bit after the hole is started.
5. Take care to place the hole through the middle of the bowl wall at the apex of the curve to ensure

that the dowel won't be cut into two pieces during the finish turning process. This would obviously negate the repair.

6. Take care to drill holes so that they don't intersect unless you are doing it for artistic purposes.

7. Insert dowels into holes as you drill them. Don't drill all the holes and then go back and insert dowels and rods later.

8. If dowels are the exact size of your drill bit or slightly larger, you won't be able to insert them by hand. Chuck them in your drill and turn them using course sandpaper to reduce the diameter slightly so that you can insert them into the bowl.

9. Using the drill to insert the dowel rods makes the process quick and easy.

10. Chuck the bowl blank on the lathe and use a hacksaw or coping saw to remove the excess metal rod and dowel stock. Try to cut the material flush with the bowl wall.

11. Turn the bowl as you normally would but use light cuts to prevent breaking wooden dowels or bending metal rods during the turning process.

12. Sharpen often as aluminum and brass rods may dull tools faster than normal.

13. Protect eyes and skin if using metal rods – shavings come off very hot.

14. As you get close to the finished dimensions of the bowl, fill cracks as you would normally. The dowels will provide the necessary strength to hold the cracks steady so filling them becomes a straightforward task.

In 2011, 93 turned boxes were showcased in the Instant Gallery. In 2012, we would like to see this number significantly increased as they are so well received and appreciated.

Beads of Courage

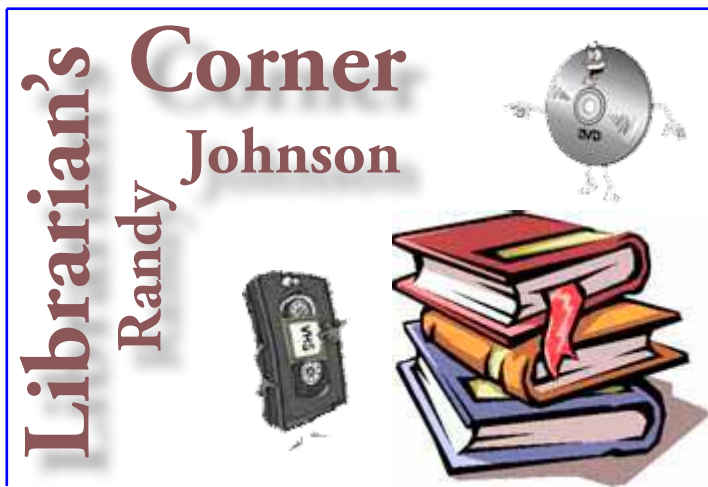

Empty Bowls 10 Year Anniversary Summary

The 10th Anniversary Celebration of Empty Bowls, benefiting Tarrant Area Food Bank, became known in the Fort Worth community as “the best Empty Bowls ever!” With a mixture of tried and true features, combined with new ideas and energy, TAFB’s signature event took on a fresh look and appeal for the more than 2,000 attendees.

A record number of ceramic bowls, almost 3400, were created by area artists and hobbyists, plus the 10th Anniversary Celebration featured works produced by area wood-turners, glass artists, and porcelain painters. Representatives from each of these media also conducted live demonstrations for the guests, displaying the painstaking time and talent it takes to produce the captivating pieces offered at Empty Bowls.

For the first time ever, there was also a Celebrity Bowls area which featured hand-painted bowls signed by stars of stage, screen, and sports: Barry Corbin, Janine Turner, Dirk Nowitzki, Lyle Lovett, LeAnn Rimes, Ron Washington, Kay Granger, Gary Patterson, Richard Petty, Nolan Ryan, Betty Buckley, Tuff Hedeman, plus the hosts from KSCS, WBAP, and the Good Morning Texas. This new component alone generated \$2,520.00.

Other new features of the event included a topsy-turvy, multi-layer, stacked-bowl anniversary cake created by Blue Bonnet Bakery, and a popular celebrity chef look-alike photo booth with TAFB’s own “Julia Child.” A cookbook sale of Tarrant County cookbooks, the \$550 in proceeds of which benefited TAFB, plus a two-item raffle, which added \$16,370 to the total, rounded out the new offerings. Musical entertainment by Candelo created the perfect background ambience for the raucous activity of bowl snagging and swapping.

All of these new features necessitated an expanded space from 50,000 to 75,000 square feet in the Will Rogers Memorial Center. The expansive room provided ample opportunity for Empty Bowls guests to queue inside the event area rather than in the concourse, creating a greater sense of ease, comfort and safety for the guests.

Restaurants, chefs and other food vendors were at their finest for this special celebration. Offering bowl-friendly fare at this event were Blue Bell Creamery, Blue Bonnet Bakery, Blue Mesa Grill, Bob’s teak and Chop House, Bonnell’s Fine Texas Cuisine, Brix Pizza and Wine Bar, City Kitchen, Judie Byrd’s Culinary School of Fort Worth, La Familia Mexican Restaurant, Lonesome Dove, McKinley’s Fine Bakery and Café, Paris Coffee Shop, the Pourhouse, Reata Restaurant, Risky’s Bar-B-Q, Shinjuku Station, TAFB Community Kitchen, Tarrant County College, SE Campus, Tokyo Café, Tom Thumb, Truluck’s, Vidalia’s Southern Cuisine, Wild Mushroom and Zoe’s Kitchen.

Tradition, as always, contributed the lion’s share to the success of the 10th Anniversary. Bump Bowls added \$7,815.00 to the bottom line; extra bowls were sold for a total of \$1,215.00; Gallery Bowls raised \$4,500.00; and the Silent Auction generated \$17,380 in revenue.

With ticket prices of \$45 for general admission, and \$125 for VIPs, the February 17 event raised a whopping \$250,000, which allows Tarrant Area Food Bank to provide 750,000 meals to the hungry in our 13-county service area!

All in all, it was truly an event to remember and Tarrant Area Food Bank is eternally grateful to all who assisted in the planning, production and presentation of the 10th Anniversary Celebration of Empty Bowls.
