Tops and More by John Solberg

The top is one of the oldest toys found on archaeological sites. They have been around for thousands of years and have been found in cultures all over the world. Today they exist from the very basic wood to some of the most elaborate metal and ball bearing tops. Three of the most common are the basic spinning top, the tippe top, and the trompo or whipping top. (See photos)







For this demonstration we are going to concentrate on the basic spinning top. Making a spinning top on a lathe is nothing more than spindle turning with the grain of the wood running parallel to the lathe bed. We will start with a basic discussion of spindle turning along with some of the basic cuts of beads, coves and the various tools that can be used. From there we will move on to turning tops. There is no one design; tops come in all shapes, sizes and material. Our goal

I attended his advanced class and probably learned more than in any other one day class I have ever taken. His all day Saturday demonstrations were fast, numerous and educational to say the least. These machines and tools are in various conditions from new overstock, one of a kind, returns, minor shipping damage, to fell off the back of a semi. Each is priced accordingly. I bought a never used \$1500 metal lathe for \$750 that had a scratch in the paint and a slightly bent piece of sheet metal. There are many bargains to be had. Getting to the Grizzly sale by 6:30am finds a line of some 200 early comers and many, many more get in line before the 8:00 opening. A lawn chair comes in real handy here. Some more seriously addicted toolaholics even spend the night in line. You meet some interesting people of like persuasion while waiting for the mad rush. When the gates open it is every man and woman for themselves as everyone tries for the best bargains first.







Grizzly really does the pricing right. On machines there is a two page serialized form that has all the particulars of damage, missing parts, etc. and a price. If you want the machine you take the front sheet leaving the second which says "SOLD". Most small items have a label that give a brief

will be to make a top that will spin for at least 60 seconds! We will discuss wood selection including size and grain orientation, tool selection and usage, top design, top turning, and will spend some time on texturing, coloring, and finish. If time permits we will finish with a tippe top - one that turns over and changes direction while spinning.

Mark balances the impatience and eagerness of creation with fundamental skills and techniques resulting in organic form and warmth. His work dramatizes the variety of line, space and weight.



Rudolph Lopez

When asked what kind of wood he most likes to turn, Rudy's response was, "imperfect wood, with knots, voids, worm holes, decay or any other flaw or defect. To me this is the beauty that God and nature has provided to me with as a starting point, and then it becomes a challenge for me to continue this and create something of beauty for others to enjoy".
