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## Multi-Axis Turning by Craig Timmerman



Craig Timmerman is a full-time artist and production woodturner living in Austin, TX. He is a nationally-known woodturner and gives demonstrations and woodturning instruction. His program on "Multi Axis Turning" will give you an opportunity to explore the idea of making your turnings with an artistic flair.

He picked up woodturning in 1998 when he took a weekend class at a local store. After that weekend the wood working equipment in his shop ceased to be used for anything except woodturning. He has now expanded into using bent lamination (the process

of gluing of thin strips of wood and bending them under pressure over a form) to augment his turnings and to produce new and exciting pieces.

Craig's specialties include hollow forms, spheres, and non-round (e.g. square) turnings. Many of his pieces combine multiple turnings and bent laminations. He works primarily with reclaimed timber--trees that have come down in storms, trees being taken down for construction, and the occasional piece of firewood. Reclaimed timber is often filled with flaws of different kinds, such as cracks, bug holes, or voids. Rather than try to remove the flaws, he accentuates them by making them the focal point of the piece, filling them with crushed stone, or carving them into other shapes.

Craig's work is in several central Texas galleries and can also be found on this website. He also does a few art shows each year, including the [Armadillo Christmas Bazaar](#)-Austin's oldest Christmas art show. He has been married to his wife Tina for over 30 years and they live just outside Austin with their two cats and two dogs. If life wasn't busy enough, Craig also sings barbershop and a cappella music with a quartet and chorus.

# Hands-On Classes and Demonstration with ALAN LACER from April 25<sup>th</sup> through May 1<sup>st</sup> Classes \$150



The classes with Alan Lacer provide our club with an opportunity for any club member to receive “world class instruction” that can accelerate your learning curve in a real hurry. Even if you have never taken a lesson or class before, you are encouraged to take one of the few classes that are still available.

I have heard some people say, “I’m not good enough to take a class from a guy like Alan Lacer.”

**NOTHING COULD BE FURTHER FROM THE TRUTH.**

Even if you have only turned for a day, a week, or year or two, a class would be worth much more than the fee charged for the class. You will not be embarrassed and you will learn so many things in a short time that you will wonder why you waited so long to get started learning from one of the best instructors in the USA.

At this writing there are only four openings for the Fundamentals Class on Sunday, April 30 and six openings for the Fundamentals Class on May 1. Starting with a good solid grasp of the fundamentals of turning is the foundation that every woodturner needs. Trying to learn good woodturning technique without taking lessons is like TRYING TO RE-INVENT THE WHEEL. You might be able to do it to some degree over time, but it is much more time consuming and difficult than allowing someone to help you, especially in the beginning.

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### **Class Schedule**

**Tuesday, April 25<sup>th</sup>**

**Skew 1:** A look at profiling, refining and achieving nasty sharp edges on this versatile tool. From there Alan will take you through at least seven different cuts to develop or improve your techniques with the skew. A primary objective of the class is to help participants to overcome any fears of the skew and build confidence in using this tool.

## Wednesday, April 26<sup>th</sup>

**Skew 2:** This is a class for those who have had the Skew 1 class or those with experience with the skew. The idea behind this session is to make between five and seven objects by only using a skew chisel. Project options will include the following: door stop, egg, stick pen, tool handle, micro spinning tops, finger top.



## Thursday, April 27th

**The Turned Lidded Box:** This is a class for those with some turning experience, especially in the area of hollowing end-grain objects. Alan will take you through a step-by-step process of making an end-grain lidded box. Each participant is expected to make two lidded boxes: the first box being rather simple but well executed, with a second being more of a challenge in terms of difficulty. Alan will cover chucking methods, techniques for hollowing end-grain, different fits and joint treatments, examples of inlays or ideas for decorative treatments. He will also show a large number of examples of his and other turners lidded boxes.



## Friday, April 28<sup>th</sup>

**Skew 1:** A look at profiling, refining and achieving nasty sharp edges on this versatile tool. From there Alan will take you through at least seven different cuts to develop or improve your techniques with the skew. A primary objective of the class is to help participants to overcome any fears of the skew and build confidence in using this tool.

**Saturday, April 29<sup>th</sup>**

**ALL-DAY DEMONSTRATION**

Alan will do a variety of things, starting with the use of the skew chisel. This will also include a discussion of sharpening techniques for the “keen-edged” tools, which also includes gouges, parting tool and hook tools. From there he will cover the issues involved in hollowing end-grain and the types of projects involved with that form of turning. As part of that discussion he will show the “whys” of hook and ring-type tool and conclude with making a basic hook tool. Using that tool he will make a turned lidded box

**Sunday, April 30**

**Woodturning fundamentals:** The goal of this one-day class will be to cover the essentials of woodturning. This will include lathe safety, types of tools, a major emphasis of sharpening all turning tools, tool selection/application, chucks and chucking, and exercises with each tool type. Class will include the making of a small turned handle and a rough-turned bowl.

**Monday, May 1<sup>st</sup>**

**Woodturning fundamentals:** Same class content as Sunday class.

All hands-on classes will be at Glynn Cox's shop, 1401 Melody Breeze Court, Keller, TX 76262.

The All-Day Demonstration will be at the club meeting site.


If you have an idea for a challenge please pass it on to Bob Wiggins.



## Beads of Courage Program

The average child gets 500 beads.

## Requirements

- The lidded bowl should be 6" in diameter (5" Min)
- The lid should have a finial that is easy for a child to grasp and not too elaborate.
- If possible have "Beads of Courage" engraved or burned in the lid or incorporating the Beads of Courage Bead.
- Your bowls can be taken to SWAT or I will take them to SWAT for you They will be displayed. Your thanks is knowing a very ill child is getting something that will help them through difficult times.
- Note: Make sure the knob on the lid is easy for a child to pick up. It could be a hole in the top also.

## SWAT 2017

Waco Convention Center

Fri. August 25th thru Sun. August 27th, 2017

Each year, the SouthWest Association of Turners (SWAT) holds one of the largest woodturning symposiums in the world. In 2017, nearly 1000 attendees enjoyed this outstanding event in Waco, Texas. Swat is an all-volunteer organization which allows the price to remain affordable low.

The Symposium features nationally and internationally recognized turners, as well as outstanding regional turners selected from participating clubs and across the country. The 2017 Symposium will be held on August 25-27 at the Waco Convention Center, 100 Washington Ave, Waco, Texas. The SWAT Symposium will offer something for every level of Woodturner.

### The Symposium features:

1. An Art Gallery where attendees may display up to 10 art pieces of their work (Some will be for sale).
2. The Banquet on Saturday night is highlighted with a drawing for beautiful turned art pieces.
3. A continuation of the drawing (using the same tickets) will be held at noon on Sunday. This drawing will consist of 2 full size lathes, a Robust and a prAxis and three new Jet 1221 Midi lathes, and a large assortment of woodturning tools and accessories.
4. There will be around 55 vendors on site selling equipment and supplies at very competitive prices.
5. Lunches are provided during the three-day event for paid attendees.

## BEADS of Courage



**Beads of Courage entrees:** These items are submitted at a separate check in table to a Beads of Courage and/or Art Gallery representative rather than general check-in. No inventory form required. The SWAT Symposium took on the Beads of Courage program in 2010 inspired by Craig Fyock, owner of Wood World, Texas. Each year the contributions for the Beads of Courage by SWAT attendees and support of our vendors has exceeded the previous year, with 149 boxes in 2014. Note: We are sorry, but unlike previous years we will not be Judging or giving prizes for the top Beads-of-Courage entries this year.

**Traditional kaleidoscopes** — Demonstration exposes turners to the basics of Kaleidoscopes.

**Illusions**—Unique decorative four center turning, creating a spatial third dimension.

#### Trent Bosch

**Revelations In Hollowing** - The creation of a hollow forming using the latest technologies.

**Sunburst platter** - creating a platter from green wood and then adding a sunburst pattern.

**Vessels of Illusion**—turning the outer hollow form, carving the vessel, turning an insert and using

wood bending to get the insert into the outer vessel.

#### Andy Cole

**Natural Edge Nested Sets** - Using the Kelton system, turning a natural edge nested set from green wood.

**Hawaiian Calabash Bowl** - Creating this pleasing shape from start to finish, oil and Beall buffing.

**Sunny side Up Egg on a Plate** - Creating this unique piece, a plate with egg white and a yellow yolk instead of a frying pan on a stove.

### **Molly Winton**

**Pyrography Tips and tricks** - Using commercially made pyrography pens as well as nichrome wire and making a brand out of a copper rivet.

**Making Mini Vessels and Carving** - Textures - using a spindle gouge, detail gouge, and homemade allen wrench hollowers, then carved and textured.

### **Al Hockenberry**

**Sand Carving** - use low cost sand blasting techniques to add images, designs, and texture to turnings by using resist to define the blasted areas.

**Natural Edge Bowl from a Crotch** - Selecting and preparing the blank, design options, and turning techniques that minimize sanding.

**Turning Triangles** - Unique multi-center turning - three sided napkins rings, ornaments and two sided turnings.

### **Eric Lofstrom**

**Skew Skills—key "dance moves"** - ultra-clean cuts and making eggs and elegantly embellished finger-tip spinning typos

**Square-rimmed Bowls** - Creating a bowl with an outward flowing rim using a square-cornered blank
