Pencil Boxes by Neal Brand



I've been a member of Golden Triangle Woodturners for about 15 years and a member of Woodturners of North Texas, Dallas Area Woodturners, and the AAW for almost as long. I enjoy turning all sorts of things, but a box is one of my favorites. In the August issue of the American Woodturner, Beth Ireland wrote a nice description of how to make a pencil box, a box that looks like a pencil. Her techniques requires little more than the standard tools that essentially all woodturners own. My plan is to demonstrate various ways to make a pencil box, including Beth's techniques as well as a few other ideas. In the process, I will talk about how a few additional tools can be helpful, although not necessary to make a pencil box. Some of the additional tools are common woodworking tools such as

the table saw and a rotary tool, but one is not so common. I'll show how access to a 3D printer can be very helpful in making jigs and parts for the final product.

Librarian's Suggested/Favorite Reads and DVD's

Not everyone begins with spindle work, but most woodturners do. They will see a turner making a pen or see someone using a "special" pen and ask about where it was purchased. Once these curious people find out a person turned that pen from a kit - in many cases - and they think this might be a good idea to turn presents for friends and neighbors. (Funny how that gets them started turning never conceiving of what lies ahead, including the cost.) Without so many of our mentors being available, (and are we glad that we have the mentors we do - plus the caliber and quality of their work) many turn to YouTube for help. This can be a really good thing, but it also may be a bit confusing. Personally, I would suggest almost anything from our friends at Craft Supply, especially when it deals with beginners and specific how-to's guides. Next to the videos available on the AAW site for members, these might just be what you want to see for help. From there, no telling where you want to go ... from simple slimline pens to the very fancy large victorian style, to the segmented and casting your own blanks. Lots to see and lots to choose from. The real problem begins when you want to move beyond pens ... bowls, vases, snowmen, minatures, inside-out turnings, and more than I can put here.

EMPTY BOWLS

Empty Bowls is an annual one-day fund raising event for the Tarrant Area Food Bank. The Food Bank provides food to sister agencies in 13 surrounding counties. The sister agencies then provide the food to needy children and families. Patrons at the Empty Bowls event pay \$65 or more and get to choose a bowl (wood, ceramic or glass) to take home and sample food from numerous booths of local restaurants. There are also numerous corporate sponsors that provide a sizeable portion of the total donations.

The May 1st 2019 event had gross income \$301 thousand which was 20% more than the previous year.

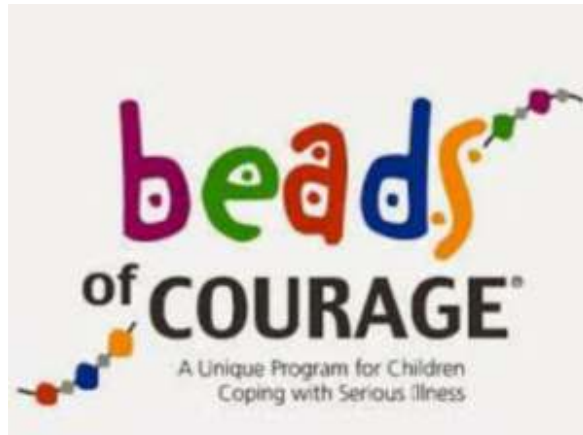
The next Empty Bowls event will be Tuesday, March 17, 2020.

Beads of Courage Program

This program is designed to support, strengthen and encourage children and families coping with serious illness. The program lets the children tell their story using colorful beads as meaningful symbols that commemorates milestones they have achieved along their treatment path. The average child gets 500 beads. The Woodturners of North Texas is taking on the challenge again this year.

Requirements

The lidded box/bowl interior diameter should be 6” (5” minimum diameter, 6” depth, 4” minimum). The lid should have a finial/knob that is easy for a child to grasp and not too elaborate. The ‘Beads of Courage’ logo bead to be placed inside or outside will be available at the meeting or can be mailed to you upon request. The “Beads of Courage” inscription can also be engraved or burned in the lid and can be placed inside or outside of the lid (no political or religious undertones are accepted). Customarily your box or bowl will be taken to SWAT and displayed along with the others from the club. Your thanks is knowing a very ill child is getting something that will help them through difficult times.
