"Taming The Skew" Many people find the skew intimidating, especially when they first Start using it, but with an understanding of the principles in making cuts with the skew, even beginners can start using it on some cuts with complete success the first time they try it. Yes, I know that some of you are going to doubt that statement, but I regularly show people who have never held any turning tool how to make a few successful cuts with the skew the first time they pick it up. The demonstration will show how easy these cuts are and how to be comfortable with the skew. If you only master two or three of the twelve cuts you can perform with this mysterious tool, you will begin to love it instead of hate it. No other tool can do exactly the same job and once you make it your friend, you will look for opportunities to use it. It is true, all cuts with the skew are not simple and yes, to be an expert with the skew in all the cuts possible, it takes practice, even if you do understand the principles. When I first started turning, the first tool I used was the skew because the word was out that "all the professionals used the skew and found that it gave the best surface of all the turning tools." Unfortunately, I did not have a teacher but I did read Dick Sing's book on pen making and watched Bonnie Klein and Richard Raffan's videos that explained something about the tool and how to use it. Believe it or not, I never had any problem with the skew while I was only making pens. Later, I discovered the reason for the lack of difficulty was that I was only using the planning cut and sometimes a roughing cut when working on pen blanks. When trying to turn beads and other curved surfaces the difficulty increases and the dreaded catches begin if you violate the cutting principles even slightly. Here is where a thorough understanding of how the skew cuts material and why practice is absolutely essential. A musician does not learn to play a musical instrument over night and neither does the woodturner develop the expertise to use the skew in a day or two. Time spent learning the techniques of exactly how the various cuts are accomplished and then practicing them will bring rewards beyond what you ever expected.

The blank, the child, however, will have different ideas about its destiny. Influences on the tree from years ago are not apparent until brought to the surface by our tools. Those influences may surprise us. They will hopefully delight, but they will always cause us to adjust our outlook, adjust the angle and choice of tool, and adjust our expectations of the finished, mature result. Maddeningly, each adjustment by us will cause a change in how the blank, the child responds to our influences. A too-thin wall may warp, and one left too thick may crack or split from unseen pressures. Each piece will tend to seek its own shape, its own balance. Hopefully, our work will help that shape, that balance to be achieved, and beauty to be brought forth. That green piece will eventually decide it is done and insist on being reverse chucked and signed. When the finish has finally dried you can then step back and admire with pride, a true work of art.
