

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When you first see a "Weird Bowl" like the ones Devore Burch makes, it is a big mystery as to how it can be turned on a lathe. For our program on February 25th, Devore will reveal his secrets about how to make this very unusual bowl. Devore made his first "Weird Bowl" in 1933, 77 years ago, when he was in a high school woodshop

class. Since that time he has made and either sold or given away over 100 of these vessels. It was one of these bowls on the cover of Popular Woodworking Magazine that attracted the attention of Larry Roberts and others who were in the initial stages of forming the Woodturners of North Texas. Over the last several months you have been hearing about Bob Rosand coming to demonstrate and teach hands-on classes for us in April. At the club meeting on Thursday, February 25th you will have the opportunity to register for the hands-on classes that will be offered.

The tuition for each of the hands-on classes is \$100 per day which is due at the time you register. You may register for as many days as you wish as long as there is an opening. His video "Turning Projects from Scrap" is a classic and one that I would highly recommend to any turner, beginner or advanced. If you are an AAW member, the DVD or VHS tape sells for \$19.00 on the AAW web site at http://www.woodturner.org.

Bob primarily turns small to medium sized objects that can be completed in a relatively short period of time. He is recognized as an excellent teacher and demonstrator. His style of demonstrating and teaching is an easy going, relaxed presentation that puts everyone at ease and promotes confidence in the student. Whether a person is an absolute beginner at woodturning or very advanced, having instruction from Bob Rosand will be a very worthwhile experience that you won't forget.

to come to a meeting and demonstrate how his bowls were made. After the demo he quickly became one of the charter members of the WNT and since that time has been a

part of every major endeavor that the club sponsors including three

prize winning collaborative projects.

Having recently turned 92 years old, Devore still regularly turns multiple items as gifts for Mary, his wife, to give to her friends as presents. For the last few years "Dee" has been turning on a Super Shop, but before that he used a Shop Smith as his lathe of choice since 1950.

For many years Devore Burch wrote and illustrated articles for four major woodworking magazines, including Fine Woodworking and Popular Woodworking. In fact it was the picture of his "Weird Bowl" on the cover of Popular Woodworking that prompted John Horn to look him up in the phone book after discovering that Devore was from Fort Worth. Devore invited him to a club meeting back in 1989 and the rest is history.





VIDEO REVIEW

Subject: Bihn Pho By Randy Johnson

This month we have two new donations by Ken Cardin. The first is Surface Design by Bihn Pho and the second is Thin Wall Turning by Bihn Pho. After reviewing them I don't know whether to thank Ken or have a contract taken out on him. I was never one for air brushing, piercing, and texturing: Bihn Pho sure makes it looks easy and he gives great technique tips for how to make your own designs. I can see that all I need is about a \$1000 worth of equipment along with talent that I do not have.

For those in the club that want to take their turnings to another level, these are excellent videos to assist you in that goal. I consider myself more of a craftsman than an artist, so Bihn Pho has opened my eyes to a totally different area of turning. Even though I did not find any mention of the wood he uses in his pieces, it did appear to be something along the lines of box elder. Light in color, easy to turn in the green stage, and no notable wood grain to distract from the designs to be applied to the turning; the wood selected is for air brushing,

piercing, and texturing. Living in Texas this type of wood may be hard to obtain. The shapes Mr. Pho turns tend to be vertical, slightly curving, and easy to pierce. Watching the amount of detail and work involved in producing one of his masterpieces, it is quite easy to grasp why his work commands such high prices and is shown in so many museums. Each is truly an original work of art. The only issue I have with that is the discrepancy of expertise that I perceive between Mr. Pho and myself; after all, if I was an unaccomplished house painter, why would I want to be an air brush artist? Even in the short time showing some of the techniques he uses, it is intimidating in the least, especially when I am still trying to learn myself. Spending more time on the art part of turning an object instead of the fun part of turning is beyond my ability to understand. This is why I begin to appreciate the Thin Wall Turning video a little more than the Surface Design video. He does shown in detail how he makes his thin wall turnings in green wood using a bowl gouge for a bowl and a Lyle Jamieson hollowing system for his very tall hollowed vases. Sometimes there is too much showing of same technique over and over again.

If you are ready to take your turning to the next stage, then please give these videos a chance. As for Ken, thanks for making me feel more insecure than I already did before these videos showed up. I cannot wait to see Ken's air brushed, pierced, and textured pieces at the next critique table. Happy turning and keep those donations coming

Smithfield Elementary School Fine Arts Day Project

On Friday, January 29th, seven members of the Woodturners of North Texas brought six mini-lathes to the Smithfield Elementary School for their annual Fine Arts Day event in North Richland Hills. Four different classes of fourth and fifth grade students turned and finished candle sticks under the supervision of the seven instructor/coach-

es. Listed below, in alphabetical order, are the club members that participated from the WNT: John Chandler, Glynn Cox, Fred Denke, John Horn, Mike Jones, John Lauderbaugh, and Steve Yauch.

In each session emphasis was placed on safety by insisting that each student wear safety glasses and a dust mask while working at the lathe. The students then turned the material that had been prepared by Glynn Cox, John Lauderbaugh, and John Horn. The students made candle sticks of



their own design with the supervision of their coaches. During the oral presentation in the sessions, the turnings of the instructors were shown and each turner told about



some of the features of the particular items the students were viewing. Since many schools today no longer teach wood shop classes, we felt it was important that the students be exposed to the joys of woodturning. As a result of our efforts, we were able to see some of the students' parents that expressed an interest in finding out more about the WNT and possibly becoming a member of the organization.

The Fine Arts Day program at the school is held each year to give the students hands on experi-

ence in a variety of artistic activities that are not available in their normal curriculum. The various sessions included painting, dancing, balloon art, music, pottery and other "fine art" activities.
