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Tool Making by On The Lathe Larry Anderson

Larry Anderson will be making some simple stuff that anyone can do on their wood lathe. Some of the things will be small drive centers, a weighted knockout bar, long and short tool rests, cheap inserts to use with unhandled tools in handles made by Trent Bosch, John Jordan, Oneway or others, some different jigs for sharpening the tips which are used in a lot of hollowing tools, power sanding for deep, hollow vessels, and other items if time permits. Below are some pictures of some of the items he intends to make.









His aim is to get people to open up to new ideas to make woodturning easier. Larry has been turning wood for about 20 years. He has taken classes from many well known wood turners, including Ray Key, Richard Raffan, David Ellsworth, Trent Bosch, John Jordan, and Ron Fleming. Larry worked in a machine shop right out of high school using a metal lathe. After military service, he worked 33 years for the telephone company. He just recently started a new job in a machine shop. Larry's two favorite pastimes are woodturning and drag racing motorcycles. He receives so much enjoyment out of woodturning and meeting the people involved that he doesn't understand why everybody isn't a woodturner.



President's message by Dave Marshall

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

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BOOK REVIEW

Subject: Turning Vintage Toys By Randy Johnson

This is a positively delightful book by Chris Reid, reviewed for you as it is a new addition to our library. From his brief biography you can guess that he is probably either from the United Kingdom or one of the British Commonwealth countries. Regardless of his country of origin, his presentations and topic will pique the interest of any woodturner. This 175 page book is just full of small toy projects that are sure to delight any small child. There are 15 projects presented, some I have not seen presented before. The projects are for various skills levels and there is something for everyone; a few of them can even challenge an adult to master the use of the toy. If you do not believe me, then turn to the "Diavolo" project and show us how well you have mastered it at the next club meeting.

The book starts with pictures of the different projects and directs you to the page number to jump right into turning them. It then leads with the introduction which I will repeat here for the reader:

This book is not about how to turn wood, but instead to give you an idea of the basic requirements for turning and assembly of specific toys. Even the fact that they are made of wood can be lost, unless you want to construct the pieces from exotic or colourful (sic) timbers which are then polished or finished to display their beauty.

Every project has a cutting list, which includes all the items that are necessary to complete each project. All measurements are presented both in imperial and metric. The drawings are divided into three different categories: anatomy drawings, blank drilling details, and expanded diagrams or detail drawings. The equipment used consists of fairly basic items that most any wood worker should have. A drill press is desirable and a chuck and various wood turning accessories (which do **not** include a hollowing system or large bowl gouges) are also shown. But the detail drawing of how to make a sphere turning jig is shown and, if you get nothing else from this book, this jig alone makes reading the book worth the effort. I might even turn a sphere, now that I can see how easy it can be accomplished.

Here's a list of just a few of the projects available: a yo-yo, a jump rope (although the foreigner calls it a skipping rope,) a woodpecker, table quoits, and of course, the Diavolo. I am not going to tell you what that is; you will just have to check the book out.

All in all, this is an excellent book, well illustrated and with a wonderful use of color. It is a pleasure to see new books of this caliber being published. I probably will purchase one for my own library. The printing date is 2009 and you know one thing that was most astonishing to see, there was only one copyright symbol by his name as author of the book. It is great to see a woodturner who enjoys


