



Deep Hollowing Techniques

arm-brace with a hook tool versus the use of a stabilizer bar and laser pointer.



He will also show other hollowing tricks in how to minimize the difficulties while maximizing the resulting deep hollowing art form. He will compare



the trials and tribulations of going through a narrow opening versus using a wider opening.

Ultimately he will demonstrate a technique of hollowing a vase through a relatively large opening and then how to cleverly add a rim that makes

it appear that the hollowing was done through a small opening.

His latest art form exploration has been pierced masks and, if time permits, he will show some aspects of how those are made from a thin-wall end-grain vase.
